For so many of our patients, getting a visit from a sweet doggie is a comfort during a difficult time. And I love that the pups (and their wonderful handlers) always make time to brighten the days of hospital staff, myself included!"



Love On 4 Paws therapy dogs visit patients throughout the hospital. Kailee visited a patient who wanted to leave the hospital, but still needed to get better. Kailee's visits served as a focus for helping the patient stay and continue treatment. The Geropsychiatric unit at USC Verdugo Hills Hospital cares for patients age 50 years and over who may be experiencing acute mental illness episodes or severe dementia or alzheimers. The Love On 4 Paws handlers and dogs visit this unit each time they arrive. They serve as a respite and connection to the outside world for patients who can be in the hospital two weeks or more. On the unit, the therapy dogs are a special part of the programming that is provided to patients. According to Mieko Takemoto, Activity Therapist, "therapy dogs are truly angels without wings. They help bring back positive memories for many patients, spread pure happiness and help patients become motivated to enjoy the moment."
